**A note to the teacher:** This is a wonderful book for a transitional reader and many of the activities have been designed specifically for that age group.

# About the book

The doll was irresistible. Dressed in red velvet and sitting perched among disregarded treasures at a neighbor's garage sale, she seemed to Jenna to be the perfect gift for her little sister. But when Jenna brought the doll home, strange things began to happen. The cat went crazy. Her sister refused to play with the doll. At night, strange noises came from Jenna's closet where the doll was stored. What was going on?

*The Red Ghost* is a companion book to *The Blue Ghost*, which was listed on the Texas Bluebonnet Award 2007-2008 Master List. As with many of Marion Dane Bauer's books, *The Red Ghost* can be read on many levels. It is full of rich imagery and has a plot that keeps the reader in suspense until the very end. Accessible to beginning readers, the storyline will also appeal to older readers and anyone who enjoys a good ghost story.

### Working with The Red Ghost

## Things to think about before you read the book

- Do you enjoy scary stories? How do they make you feel?
- Do you know someone who doesn't like scary stories? Do you know why they don't like them?
- Have you ever had a toy that belonged to someone else? A grandfather? A cousin? A friend?
- Have you ever read a mystery before? What makes a story a mystery?
- What does it mean when something is haunted? Do you think that's only in stories or is that real?

#### Things to think about after you read the book

- Have you woken up in the night and thought you heard a sound? Did you figure out a story about what might have made that sound?
- When did you realize that the doll was haunted?
- Did you understand right away what Quinn meant when she said the doll was "full"? Do you think the author wanted you to find out slowly?
- Why do you think Rocco and Quinn were the first ones to "hear" Hazel, the ghost trapped inside the doll?
- Why do you think Hazel's mother kept the doll after Hazel died?

#### **Unfamiliar terms**

Have the students predict what these words and phrases might mean, based on their context. Have them look up what the words mean after the story has been read.

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### **CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES**

1. **Being Scared.** Have students draw, write a song, or write a story about something that scares them.

Have a discussion about how we work through being scared. Jenna was scared by the doll, and so were Dallas, Quinn, and Rocco. Even Miss Tate was scared by the doll. How do we know that each of these characters felt scared? What did those characters do to move past being scared? How do we do this in our own lives?

2. What Toys Mean to Us. You might also have students write, draw, tell a story out loud, or sing a song they've composed about a toy that means a lot to them. Think about starting out this activity by singing "The Marvelous Toy." This website has the lyrics, an instrumental version so your class can sing along, and a video of Peter, Paul, and Mary singing the song.

3. **Storytelling.** If you sense that the students in your class won't be frightened, engage in a session of storytelling. Have them sit in a circle, with the lights out, passing a flashlight around to shine up into their faces as they tell a scary story.

You might have them tell the story of *The Red Ghost* as they best remember it, passing the flashlight to a new person to tell each new scene.

Talk about the differences between reading a story and telling it out loud. How do our memories for the story play into telling a written story aloud for others to hear? Do our voices change? Do we use our bodies differently? Does it make a difference if we're sitting in a circle rather than having one person standing in front of us or walking among us? How is storytelling different from watching a story on television?

# How mysteries fit into Bloom's Taxonomy

- Knowledge: Students arrange characters and events in the mystery.
- Comprehension: Students classify events, describe characters, and explain precisely what has occurred.
- Application: Students apply existing knowledge to the mystery by illustrating, dramatizing, and writing their interpretations.
- Analysis: Students analyze, categorize, and differentiate characters and events.
- Synthesis: Students collect and organize facts to form hypotheses.

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• Evaluation: Students appraise, argue, assess, and evaluate their opinions in the process of solving the mystery.
